

## **Missing salon owner may hold clues in shooting - Police seek answers after one person is killed at Eight Mile shop; another victim is in critical condition.**

EASTPOINTE -- Police believe **Shannon Anderson** may be able to shed light on a deadly shooting Monday at the Wild Stylz Salon on Eight Mile.

But Anderson, who opened the salon just a few weeks ago, was still missing Tuesday.

"We're still hoping to find the owner of the salon, but so far he's not contacted us," Eastpointe Police Lt. Leo Borowsky said. "Right now, we're calling him a person of interest in this case, but so far we haven't been able to get a hold of him."

The shooting happened about 5:20 p.m. Monday inside the salon. When police arrived at the scene, a man met them in the parking lot with gunshot wounds to his arm and side. A second man lay dead inside the salon. Police believe a third man ran from the scene after the shooting.

Investigators recovered a revolver and a semi-automatic pistol at the scene.

"There are a lot of questions right now," Borowsky said. "We don't know who the shooter was."

The injured man is not talking to police, Borowsky said.

"He's not giving us any information about what the argument was over, or who did the shooting," he said.

The salon was closed Tuesday, and yellow police tape was still wrapped around the front door. A piece of wood covered the glass door pane, which was shattered. Inside the salon, a blood stain was visible on the tile floor, along with circles drawn in black marker by police to show where shell casings landed.

Police did not release the names of either victim. The man who was injured was listed in critical condition in an area hospital, Borowsky said. He is expected to recover.

Anderson, 28, is on parole. He served eight years in prison for a 1996 armed robbery. He was released from prison in 2003, and the next year, he was arrested for possession of less than 25 grams of cocaine. He was fined \$500, and he returned to prison for parole violation. He was released May 10.

"He really wanted to get his life together," said his attorney, Bill Shelhart. "One of his goals was to open the salon, and he was successful doing that."

Anderson's uncle, Rick Graham, said he is worried about Anderson.

"We haven't heard anything yet," Graham said. "I've been calling around to see if anyone in the family has heard anything, but so far, nobody has heard anything."

Graham said Anderson's parents helped him open the salon.

"He was really looking forward to doing things the right way," he said.

"Did he have enemies? Who knows? When you get into the crime lifestyle, you meet all kinds of folks. But I hadn't heard that anyone was after him.

"This whole thing is just very weird," Graham said. "We don't know what's going on, and we don't want to speculate about what might have happened. Right now, we just want to know where he is, and that he's OK."
